COVID-19 Disability, Leave and Health Management Workplace Safety and Health Minnesota Governor Tim Walz has issued a statewide "stay at home" order, effective at 11:59 p.m. on March 27, 2020, until 5:00 p.m. on April 10, 2020.

The Governor issued the order in an effort to slow the spread of the coronavirus (COVID-19) and provide an opportunity for the healthcare system to prepare for the expected increase in demand.

The order directs individuals to restrict their movements outside of their homes except for essential needs. Permissible activities include:

- Health and safety activities;
- Outdoor activities;
- Obtaining necessary supplies and services;
- Essential and interstate travel;
- Caring of others, such as caring for a family member, friend, or pet in another household
- Displacement;
- Relocation to ensure safety; and
- Tribal activities and lands.

Individuals who leave their homes are encouraged to continue to practice social distancing measures, including staying six feet apart from others. More detailed guidance on permissible activities is provided in the FAQs published by the Minnesota Governor's office.

The order identifies various categories of "essential" businesses that may remain open.

Additionally, the order provides an exemption for "critical service" workers based on federal guidance from the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) identifying individuals deemed necessary to ensure the maintenance of critical infrastructure and services. Critical service workers who cannot work from home are permitted to continue traveling to their place of work or, when necessary, throughout the performance of their work duties. Critical service workers include, but are not limited to:

- Healthcare and public health;
- Law enforcement, public safety, and first responders;
- Childcare providers;
- Emergency shelters;
- Homeless shelters;
- Food and agriculture;
- News media;
- Energy;
- Water and wastewater;
- · Critical manufacturing; and

## Financial services.

Nothing in the order restricts telework for non-critical service workers, but it encourages individuals who are able to work from home to continue to do so.

Although the order will be lifted on April 10, bars, restaurants, and other places of public accommodation, closed as of March 17 from a previous order, are to remain closed for dine-in service until May 1, 2020.
